

Dear friends

The daffodils are in full bloom, the wind has dropped and the sun has some warmth in it, so it must be spring, and for many, that also means chicks, bunnies, and, inevitably, chocolate Easter eggs.

Several of us have spent an interesting and entertaining Lent studying some of the themes presented in the film, *Chocolat*. Just one of these themes is that of the wind of change and how we're all in need of having our cobwebs blown away so that we may embrace the different ideas and points of view that we've become deaf and blind to, and so begin the process of transformation. One telling line in the study book urged that unless difference and new things are accepted and understood, then 'the Church will gradually retreat into a world of unreality, like wheezing, retired colonels taking tiffin' (ouch!)

During Eastertide, we're called once again to new life. Christ's resurrection was what first called the Church into being and turned a group of demoralised, ordinary men, into such wonderful evangelists that, against all odds, the course of history was changed for ever. But it's important that the Church doesn't just focus on the Empty Tomb. There are some that believe chocolate eggs represent the stone which was rolled in front of it, but that keeps us focussed on Good Friday and perhaps more to the point, we should think of the stone rolled away like an egg shell that's discarded when the life within it bursts out. The real significance is what happened next: lives were transformed and had become freed from their empty wrapping.

Wouldn't it be wonderful if new life could be seen bursting out of our churches? The archbishops have asked every parish to use the week before Pentecost to pray for the evangelisation of the country, so let's start by praying for that new life in our community, and we don't have to wait until May.

Happy Easter and every blessing

TO BE A PILGRIM

I read recently that Pope Francis had granted Minor Basilica status, a rare designation, to the Catholic shrine at Walsingham in north Norfolk, and I was reminded immediately of an unusual visitor to our place in Kingston Blount in 2004.

Serena received a letter out of the blue from an intending pilgrim whose name was John and who was planning to walk from one place of pilgrimage, Walsingham, where he lived, to the ancient pilgrimage centre of Santiago de Compostela in north-west Spain, where the Feast of St James was being especially celebrated in 2004. The money to be raised from that 800-mile walk was to go to a charity founded in remarkable circumstances by a Walsingham priest in order to help to repair the damaged lives of street children in Colombia.

John's plan involved walking along old cross-country tracks such as the Greater Ridgeway, but this presented him with the problem of finding as many as 40 different places to make overnight stops during the English leg of his pilgrimage. And those stops needed to be as close as possible to his chosen route. He decided to contact clergy along his route to ask for an evening meal and a bed for the night. Since we live close to the Ridgeway he wrote to Serena, who had been priested four or five years earlier, to ask for help, and she said "yes."

So it was, that on a horribly wet afternoon at the end of April 2004, the drenched and muddy figure of this complete stranger presented himself on the door-step of our farm labourer's cottage. If John had been expecting a Georgian vicarage he was too polite to say so and if we had been expecting him to be clad in cape, sandals and broad-brimmed hat with scallop shells and carrying an eight foot stave then we also were too polite to say so.

After John had had a bath and seen to the drying of his clothes, he turned out to be a charming guest and the evening went convivially. We were told then that the Colombian charity had come about because the street children had effectively saved the life of the Norfolk priest. When John left the following morning, on another wet day, he was heading for Plymouth in order to cross to Santander and begin the Spanish leg of his pilgrimage. Regular postcards told us of his progress and safe arrival but we already knew that he had no plans to walk home!

We subsequently stayed with his family in Walsingham and visited both the Catholic and Anglican shrines there.



ARPC have decided to prepare a NP with the aim of completion by end 2017 (please see separate article), the $1^{\rm st}$ meeting is on Tuesday $10^{\rm th}$ May at KBVH at 7.30pm, this meeting will determine the membership of the Steering Committee and outline timing plan.

Defibrillator

The new defibrillator at Aston Rowant School has now been installed. Special thanks are due to Energy Company SSE for their contribution, and to Peter Tinson, Mandy Brine and Tom Sowerby who is also organising the training etc.

Astonbury 2016

A representative from ARCC and *Astonbury Enterprises (AEL)* attended the 2nd March ARPC meeting at which some concerns were raised about the events for 2016 as follows:

- 1. Clash with the Point to Point
- 2 Traffic and noise
- 3 How will ARCC benefit financially in 2016 and especially in future years
- 4 The status of the licence application(s) for 2016 (currently being considered by SODC).

On 6^{th} March AEL delivered leaflets to houses in KB, which answered many of the concerns. The 1^{st} event is STATUS QUO on Sunday 29^{th} May and tickets are available via www.Astonbury.net.

Let's hope for a wonderful dry evening. ARCC will be making a presentation which will include plans for a new clubhouse and ground development at the Annual Parish Meeting in April (see below).

Oxfordshire County Council (OCC)

Following a meeting at the Kassam stadium in Sept 2015, OCC have indicated that they will be releasing details in April of which Parish Councils are to undertake responsibility for all Grass cutting. ARPC have already indicated that subject to satisfactory funding transfer we are willing to be selected in the first tranche of Parishes and so to take full responsibility within the Parish.

You may also have read interesting news where six Oxfordshire District Councils (e.g. SODC for our Parish) are proposing to unite in some way and replace OCC. This trend of the reorganisation of local government based upon the need for further cost savings and efficiency will inevitably lead to more roles being undertaken by Parish Councils, a need for increased budgets and local organisation.

And finally, **The Annual Parish Meeting** will be held at Kingston Blount Village Hall on **Wednesday April 13**th **at 8 pm**, following the formal ARPC meeting at 6.30pm. The Hillwerke Trust, Allotments, ARCC, and other local community groups will make presentations regarding 2015 and their plans for 2016. The May meeting is scheduled for 11th May at KBVH at 7.30pm.

PARISH OIL SYNDICATE

For those of us in the parish who need oil, there's nothing worse than paying over the odds. You can make savings by joining the Aston Rowant oil syndicate where, without charge, I collate the oil requirements of householders and negotiate the best price.

The process is simple. Top ups are generally delivered in June, November and February (weather and demand depending). I send out a call for householder's demand and once complete, send the details to the lowest priced oil company. Householders pay the oil company and there is no charge for taking part or any need to take part in every top up.

Large savings come from saving pennies. Using the last (February) top up as an example, householders paid 23p/litre + VAT - it would have been around 27p/litre for a 500 litre delivery from the same company.

NOTES FROM THE ALLOTMENT

My wife, Jeanette, and I moved into KB in January 2015, and as soon as the deal was struck on our house, Hester's Barn, I made contact with Lavinia Martins, and secured a 5-pole allotment garden for the annual rental of £12. I have always had an allotment garden throughout my adult life and it will be no surprise to you that they vary enormously. What is surprising, however, is that each garden can be quite different as you move across the field. One allotment may grow a crop splendidly, while two plots away that same crop struggles.

What every field does have in common, however, is the friendly nature of the gardeners. Wander on to any allotment field and you can be sure that someone will welcome you and share with you the challenges their patch presents. It's a wonderful way to make friends and, true to form, I have received a warm welcome at Hillock Gardens.

I profess minimal expertise, but have the enthusiasm to enjoy cultivating vegetables and flowers and sharing produce with fellow gardeners and friends. A gentle wander through our field will show how well our field is run and how abundant is the enthusiasm and expertise of the members.

Allotments are measured in 'rods' (perches or poles) – measures that date back some 1400 years. Ten poles is the usual measure of an individual allotment – approx. 30 sq.yards (25 m^2). Frequently allotments are sub-divided so that some are 5 poles – like mine, which is an excellent size for the beginner gardener.

As I write this piece in March, the weather is as cold as it has been any time this winter but the forecast is for warmer weather, which will enable us to get out the Radox and Deep Heat as we begin some spring digging.

As Bert Fry said, rather emotionally, in last week's Archers – 'Spring is the most wonderful time, as the earth wakes from its winter sleep.'

Now's the time to be ready to plant potatoes (I had great success on my plot with Charlotte and Maris Piper. Both have a lovely flavour and seemed to like my soil). Also get ready to plant your onion sets and garlic – both of which are my kind of plant – Stick'em in and watch'em grow! Comandeer the airing cupboard for two/three weeks and plant your peas and beans in plantpots full of compost and watch them shoot, ready for planting out in early April.

Wishing you "good gardening," and if you have an allotment I'd be delighted to receive any questions/comments for the next issue. If I don't know the answer to your query, I know some very good allotmenteers who will.

Neighbourhood planning (NP) is the government's initiative to empower all local communities to develop and then take forward planning proposals at a local level.

ARPC held a Public meeting on Wednesday 10th February at 8 pm at Kingston Blount Village Hall to discuss the options for a NP.The meeting was attended by over 80 households from the Parish.

Charlotte Colver, a Neighbourhood Planning Officer from SODC made a presentation and then there followed a lively open forum with the meeting Chaired by Andy Green. The SODC website (just Google "SODC Neighbourhood Plan") lists a 10 step plan to complete a NP and some details of other similar plans currently under development.

At the following ARPC meeting held on Wednesday 2nd March, a motion to proceed with the development of a NP for the parish was approved. It was decided to align the plan with the SODC 2031 local plan currently under development.

A draft timing plan was circulated with a target to complete the NP by end 2017

The basic 10 step plan is as follows:

Step one - Is a Neighbourhood Plan for you? Completed March 2016

Step two - What kind of plan do you want? May 2016

Step three - Getting started. May 2016

Step four - Setting the area your plan will cover? June 2016

Step five - Getting funding. July 2016

Step six - Preparing your plan. Oct 2016-May 2017

Step seven - Submitting your plan. July 2017

Step eight - Independent examination. Sept 2017

Step nine - The referendum. Oct 2017

Step ten - Adopting your plan. Dec 2017

A NP consists of sections covering location and type of housing, affordable housing, regeneration of derelict land, design, infrastructure, local green space, land use, conservation, specifications for development and type of use etc.

NPs are developed by a team of residents utilising their considerable specialist skills and local knowledge. The Parish Council acts as the facilitator for the process and also makes the various funding applications and formal plan submissions



The school makes considerable efforts to ensure children have exposure to a wide experience beyond their local community during which these concepts are shown, through for example, sporting events, school trips and residential visits to Devon. We also feel it is important to acknowledge St David's, St Patrick's, St George's and St Andrew's Day in school. We have begun to celebrate the customs and cultures of all four countries individually as well as talking about the UK as a whole.

Also this term, we raised £115 for the Sport's Relief Charities. The children ran a mile around Aston Rowant cricket ground in aid of the charity. It was lovely to see members of the community, parents and grandparents taking part too. The children helped and encouraged each other to complete a mile.

Our Remembrance, Harvest and Easter services were held at St Peter and St Paul's church in Aston Rowant. The children wrote prayers and took part in readings for the service. Year 4 children played the recorder to accompany some of the Hymns.

The children have taken part in Oxfordshire's Big Science event this term. The children designed and carried out their own investigations based on a scientific question that they would like to answer. Some examples were 'Which material would make the best umbrella?' 'Which washing powder is the best at removing stains?' 'How many worms are there in the school field?' and many more. The children designed posters and presentations which will be judged by a panel of Oxfordshire scientists in June. We have had finalists from Aston Rowant School for the past two years running so hopefully we will have another successful year.
