ASTON ROWANT PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Welcome to my final update of the calendar year.

A year ago I opened my update by reporting that a house on the B4009 in Kingston Blount had been struck by a car causing damage to the property. Sadly, a year on, the same property was hit again only the damage this time was significantly worse.

Councillors have since met with Oxfordshire County Council traffic officials at the site and have discussed a number of options to reduce the likelihood of further incidents at this particular point of the road.

Clearly, the severity of any accident is reduced if traffic is moving more slowly. The consultation on the traffic calming measures in Kingston Blount has now closed – thank you to those of you who responded. At the time of writing chicanes have been marked out on the B4009 to allow further assessments on their positioning and effectiveness. The Parish Council will continue to work with the County towards a solution that reduces traffic speed without an adverse effect on those who live along the road. (Matthew Day's Traffic Calming Report is on page 13.)

A report on the work of the Neighbourhood Plan Committee appears on pages 14–15. It is a common trend for there to be an increase in submissions for major planning applications during the time that Neighbourhood Plans are being prepared. We accept that this is inevitable as the Aston Rowant plan is formed. However, we encourage developers to present their plans to the community either at Parish Council meetings or at an alternative open public meeting so that they are aware of concerns and can tailor their plans so that any development is in keeping with the local environment.

The December meeting is where the precept for the coming financial year is set. The Council has, over the years, budgeted to provide modest grants to a number of charities and other organisations with local connections. Although we cannot issue grants to all that apply, we are reviewing the grants this year and so would like to hear about any local organisations who may benefit from a modest level of support. Please contact the Clerk before December 6th.

Finally, as this is the last issue of the Parish Notes of the year, I will take the opportunity to wish you all the best for Christmas and the New Year.

TRAFFIC CALMING

Below is an update on the traffic calming measures currently being developed for a double chicane to be placed at the entrance to Kingston Blount near the cricket club.

The consultation by Oxfordshire County Council (OCC) highways department is now closed and we have had the comments back. Sixteen residents wrote in to support the application. As part of the process the Police were consulted and confirmed that they have no objections. There were two objections from residents of Kingston Blount.

I met with OCC highways engineers and we discussed the objections raised and they confirmed that the objections are easily addressed or answered and should not be an issue.

You may have seen white lines marking out where the chicanes will go and these will be used to set up a mock version of the chicane so OCC and the Parish Council can monitor the effect of a chicane and we can make any minor adjustments as needed before it is built.

When there are objections, approval for this type of work can't be decided by the OCC highways engineer alone, it must go to an OCC committee meeting, as it will in this case. This will mean a delay as the highways officer could not directly approve the scheme. The committee meeting will not be held until mid to late January 2018.

The OCC highways engineer is looking into the cause of the recent accident on the High Street and will report back to us with his assessment as how to how to improve highway safety for this area.

The Parish Council are keen to start working with Aston Rowant residents on what they would like to see to improve road safety and reduce speeding. Please email or write to the ARPC clerk with ideas and your contact details so we can get this underway as soon as possible.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The NP process, slow as it is in order to satisfy the criteria established by the government, has reached its next consultation stage. The community has to a) establish the objective criteria by which it agrees to judge the suitability of potential housing sites, and b) define its Green Spaces in accordance with established criteria.

HOUSING SITES – HOW TO ASSESS THEIR SUITABILITY

The Steering Group has devised ten draft criteria to be used, with a scoring system yet to be agreed to measure the suitability of sites that have been suggested as possible housing opportunities. They are set out in the flyer that accompanies the Parish Notes and will be on the NP website. We need your views as to:-

- a) are they appropriate measures by which to make these judgments,
- b) should anything be added or omitted, and
- c) should there be a weighting system whereby some criteria should be afforded greater or lesser weight than others, and, if so, which criteria should be so weighted?

Before any sites can be assessed the community of AR Parish must be consulted and the terms of reference for site assessment agreed, hence this exercise. This is not about specific sites, nor about the volume of support or disapproval of any sites, but rather about how all potential sites may be objectively ranked and measured. The ranking system and the public support given to it may, in due course, be the subject of independent scrutiny and affect our ability to rely upon the NP.

We therefore need your views on the draft criteria so that, in the new year, the agreed criteria may be used in the site assessment process and the duly ranked sites may become part of the next consultation stage. Any views are welcome by email or by returning the flyer via the NP email address – np@astonrowant.org.uk.

One of the draft criteria would involve the definition of settlement boundaries for AR and KB. If that is accepted in principle, allowing that potential housing sites would secure a higher ranking within a settlement while Protected Green Spaces might be within a settlement boundary or outside, then the settlement boundary would have to be agreed and, as important, justified. Again, views from within the community would be welcome as to where the boundaries might be drawn.

For those interested in learning more of the processes involved in the preparation of the NP, there is a lot of good stuff on SODC's website – www.southoxon.gov.uk – following the planning, planning policy and neighbourhood plan links, and through the My Community website: https://mycommunity.org.uk/resources/site-assessment-for-neighbourhood-plans and https://mycommunity.org.uk/resources/housing-needs-assessment-at-neighbourhood-plan-level.

It's not rocket science, but it's not far off!

GREEN SPACES

Not all green spaces will be eligible for formal protection through the NP. Some are easier to justify than others. Large tracts of land in agricultural use would generally not be eligible, but would perhaps secure an alternative level of protection from development by being outside a defined settlement. The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) suggests that most green spaces would not be eligible. Some might, indeed, come forward as potential housing land. Protected spaces should be close to the community, demonstrably special to that community, hold a particular local significance and have an active recreational value.

The Steering Group has established three levels, based on this central government guidance.

Grade 1 spaces will be established elements within the settlements, accessible to and used by the public, while contributing to the history and/or character of that settlement. E.g. Village greens

Grade 2 spaces will tend to be recreational spaces in active or potentially active use. E.g. playing fields, allotments.

The Steering Group proposes that spaces defined as Grades 1 and 2 should be put forward in the NP as Local Green Spaces which would be afforded the presumption of immunity from development and, as such, not assessed as possible housing sites.

Grade 3 spaces are likely to be more numerous and harder to justify in the terms outlined in the NPPF. They would tend to be privately-owned, not accessible to or used by the general public, but, nonetheless, of historical interest, of amenity value in defining the setting or character of the villages or of ecological significance. Their inclusion in the NP as protected Local Green Spaces cannot be so readily guaranteed. Evidence of their value and importance will be needed.

By the time that this issue of Parish Notes reaches your mailbox, the open spaces, suggested following the consultation in June and assessed on the above criteria, will be made available, in map form, on the NP page of the Parish Council website. Comments will be invited, particularly from anyone wishing to see a particular space re-assigned within the three groups. Comments should preferably be informed by the available guidance, maybe starting at: https://mycommunity.org.uk/resources/neighbourhood-planning-local-green-spaces.

These maps may also help in forming residents' views on settlement boundaries, if it is your wish that we go down that route. You may find the Brightwell-cum-Sotwell NP helpful in this regard, via the SODC website.

"Evidence" and not "opinion" is, like it or not, the key to getting a NP through the system.

With the recent activity on the planning application front, especially in AR, there has been increased awareness of the need to press ahead with the NP and of the need for the NP to follow full consultation procedures at each stage. Your continued participation in this process is therefore both welcome and essential.

Resurfacing of the KB to AR Footpath

No more muddy shoes for children walking to and from Aston Rowant School trumpeted the Thame Gazette. We will see what happens when the really wet weather hits us. But it is much better than it was and the Parish Council now intend to put more small graded plannings down on the section by the Aston House Stud fields to try to improve things in that moister area. The section from Town Farm to the end of the Cricket Club has been given an improved base, boarded sides to provide stability, and resurfaced with Coxwell Oxfordshire Stone Gravel working to an OCC specification and laid by one of their accredited contractors.

It is not designed for horses and the OCC Footpath Warden is working with all the land owners towards stopping horses using the footpath altogether. One landowner has already stipulated 'No Horse Riding' so in theory there is no way through for horses and they are trespassing when they are ridden there. Please note that it is not suggested that, as an alternative, horses are ridden along the B4009. There are two very good bridleways running parallel and within half a mile either side of the footpath.

Aston Rowant school children, parents, teachers, parishioners, land owners and people who gave generously to the project gathered in early November to see land owner, Garth Weston declare the path open. Afterwards we enjoyed tea and biscuits at the church. Many thanks to our hosts.

At least 50 children and their parents already walk to and from school each week day and it is estimated that over 200 journeys are made each day along the path, including people going to church, the village hall and playing fields, the cricket club, school, or just walking the dog or taking a stroll.

The Parish Council started community fund raising for the project some two years ago bolstered by grants from Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment TOE2, supported by Grundon, and the Garfield Weston Foundation. Further contributions came from a landowner, parishioners, the Kingston Blount Street Fair, Hillwerke Village Hall Trust, and Aston Rowant Parish Council.

The cost of the project was £25,500 including the VAT which can be reclaimed. A big thank is given to all those who contributed in all sorts of ways to this project.


