A LETTER FROM OUR RECTOR

Dear friends

I'm delighted to say that the building of the new Rectory has begun. There was a long pause between the archeological dig last year when Saxon walls were discovered and various bits and pieces of artefacts had to be removed and the lines of walls documented, but the build itself is now well under way. Hopefully, it will all be complete by the autumn.

I'm reminded of several stories about building in the Bible: the building of the Temple in Jerusalem by King Solomon, the parable of the wise man who built his house upon a rock (and the foolish one who built his on sand) (Matthew 7. 24-27/ Luke 6. 46-49) and the building of the tower of Babel (Genesis 10. 9-10). This was a massive, grandiose construction and its builders intended it to reach heaven. The story goes that the whole world had only one language at the time, so everyone could understand each other. God saw the tower that was being built and perceived what a powerful force the people's unity of purpose created. In his wisdom, God saw that the people were building a monument to themselves to draw attention to their abilities and great achievement and that this could only lead them away from him. As a result, he confused their language and caused them to speak in many languages so that they couldn't understand each other. The plans failed and the people scattered over the whole earth. The point of the story is that a unity of purpose which has its roots in human ambition and selfishness can be destructive.

June 4th this year is the day when the Church celebrates its birthday with Pentecost (Whitsun), the coming of the Holy Spirit. In the Pentecost account (Acts 2. 1-13), the Spirit descends as tongues of fire and everyone present starts to speak in diverse languages. Oddly, those who were present and who came from many other countries, heard and understood what was being said: everyone was speaking of the power of God. This seems to me like Babel in reverse. What happened there confused the world by dividing it into separate countries and languages, resulting in misunderstanding, rivalries and conflict. Pentecost is the beginning of the reunification of humanity, but its central meaning concerns the descent of the Holy Spirit promised by Jesus enabling his presence and mission to continue in the world today.

Pentecost doesn't feature much in the calendar, except for church attenders, but with the imminent General Election and the continuing negotiations towards leaving Europe, perhaps we can all learn a lesson from it: that we need to pull together for understanding and lasting peace and be unified by the love of God.

On the next page is $\,$ one of the prayers that the Church of England has published in advance of the Election.



'If you go down to Crowell today you may have a big surprise.'

In the car park, the nettles and dock have gone and digging is underway. It is a large undertaking and I am doing it in easy sections. I have managed to do the middle section and the box hedging cross is in situ. I have filled the inner section with plum coloured slate and lemon primroses mark the positions of head, sponge, hands, pierced side and feet. I plan to complete, and plant, each section as I manage to dig and remove nettle tap roots.

Most of the plants will have a 'church' or 'family connection'. There are lots of poppies, roses, clematis and woodland plants. I also plan to plant herbs like rosemary, thyme, marjoram and many others which villagers and visitors will be invited to come and pick for their own culinary needs.

There have been many positive comments from walkers, pub visitors and especially villagers who are pleased to see the rough ground put to good use. It will be a work in progress for many months, so please bear with us as Andy and I gradually dig and plant each section.

There will be some surprises along the way and I intend to produce a plan of the plants used, their names and positions. Meanwhile, I am having the time of my life.

LAUNCH OF VICTIMS FIRST

The Police and Crime Commissioner (PCC) for Thames Valley, Anthony Stansfeld, has launched his 'Victims First' brand and website. Victims First is the new overarching title for the PCCs work in providing support, increasing accessibility and improving services for victims of crime across Berkshire, Buckinghamshire and Oxfordshire.

The first initiative under 'Victims First' is a new online resource which has advice on what to do and how to get help if you've been a victim of crime, including information on what you should expect from the police and other criminal justice agencies if you report the crime.

The focal point of the website is a directory which allows victims to find relevant support to help them cope and recover from the impact of the crime. Members of the public will be able to use the website to refer themselves directly to the PCCs own support services, using the online form, or find information and contact details for other organisations. This support is available regardless of whether or not the victim has reported the crime to the police.

The website has information and advice to help people to recognise hidden crimes such as modern slavery, domestic abuse, including coercive control, and hate crime. Victims First also provides a third party reporting mechanism for hate crime so that those who don't want to report directly to the police can either complete a reporting form on the website or call 0300 1234 148.

The PCC has undertaken extensive work to improve support for victims of crime, including commissioning new services for young victims, victims of sexual violence, a victim-led restorative justice service and a local support service to assist other victims.

Victims First encompasses all of this work and will expand over the coming year, with the PCC reviewing his services to ensure that victims continue to have appropriate support in place, are able to easily access it and that agencies, including the police, are victim-focussed.

Anthony Stansfeld, Police and Crime Commissioner said: "I believe it will be a valuable resource not just for victims but also for people and organisations that come into contact with victims of crime who can now use the website to find and refer people to an appropriate service. Victims First will continue to develop over the next year with plans to create a single referral doorway, a specialist counselling service and community signposting points with the aim of simplifying access and improving support for victims."

ASTON ROWANT SCHOOL HOUSE TRUST

The Aston Rowant School House Educational Trust was set up 1992 when the former teacher's house, belonging to the Aston Rowant Church of England Primary School, was sold. The money from the sale was invested to raise income which is available to assist with education.

The precise rules are that the Scheme allows the Trustees to apply the income:

ASTON ROWANT PARISH COUNCIL ANNUAL REPORT

A year ago, Andy Green, then chair of the Parish Council, noted in his annual report that the year had seen a lot of change. This past year has been no different - the pace of change has, if anything, picked up. Peter Gibbons and Andy Green both decided to step down from the Council. Both have made significant contributions to the Council and parish life over recent years and I would like to thank them for their contribution. Sadly in February we also lost Gordon Crossley who died after a short illness. As I noted in Gordon's obituary in the last edition of the Parish Notes, he was a stalwart of the village - in addition to being a Parish Councillor he served on the Village Hall Committee for over thirty years. Finally Steph Johns, our Parish Clerk for three and a half years, moved to become Sydenham's Clerk. Our loss is their gain - I would like to thanks Steph for her work during her time with us and, in particular, for her support during my first six months as Chair.

On the credit side, I am pleased to welcome Lawney Hill as a new Councillor and Tracy Lambourne as the new Parish Clerk. Both took up their new roles in the autumn and are already contributing much to the work of the Council. We do, however, have two vacancies on the Council. The vacancies have been advertised but, in the event that insufficient parishioners petition for an election, the Council will be able to co-opt to fill the two vacancies. If you are interested in joining the Council, please contact Tracy Lambourne or myself.

Much of the work of the Council is reported on elsewhere in these notes so, rather than replicating those reports, I shall highlight a number of other points. Firstly, Oxfordshire County Council and South Oxfordshire and Vale of the White Horse District Councils have submitted a proposal to the Cabinet Office to establish a unitary authority covering the whole of Oxfordshire except the city of Oxford itself. The new authority, if the proposal is approved, would be active from April 2019. It is anticipated that some elements of authority would be devolved to local area boards to promote greater involvement in decision making by local communities. However, the size of the areas (and hence the level of influence we may have as a parish) are yet to be determined.

The volume and speed of traffic through the parish continues to be an issue, particularly along the B4009. A number of properties on the High Street in Kingston Blount have been damaged in accidents - consequently traffic calming in Kingston Blount will be a major focus for the Council in the coming year. That is not to say that it will be our only focus - we are aware that speeding is an issue along many of the roads in the parish and we will look to take steps to encourage traffic to slow down through our villages. We have a number of signs that can be stuck to the side of wheels bins for parishioners to use and have written to Oxfordshire County Council requesting that a warning sign alerting drivers to horse riders are installed on Kingston Hill.

The Council kept well within the budget for 2016/17; allowing for committed spending invoiced in March there was an underspend of around £2500. This sum will

be transferred to reserves. The cost of any traffic calming measures have to be met by the parish. The Council agreed to commit a sum from reserves to spending on traffic calming but will also investigate other options such as the Community Infrastructure Levy. The Council felt that it would be prudent not to run the reserves too low and so agreed to increase the precept to maintain the reserves at reasonable level.

It is disappointing to report that the Cherry Tree remains closed. There was some initial interest in purchasing the pub as a going concern which did not come to fruition and I understand that there has been some recent interest. However, given the length of time the Cherry Tree has been up for sale, we are not optimistic that it will continue as a pub.

Finally, I should like to thank all the Councillors, volunteers who serve our community, for their work during the course of the year. Volunteers are the lifeblood of communities such as ours and I would like to acknowledge and thank all those that have contributed to parish life by organising events, by helping out at the Cricket Club, or by working on the committees and groups that underpin the various activities. Often this work falls on a dedicated few so it was pleasing to see a number of new faces come forward. I hope the trend continues and others get involved to keep our Parish the place it is.

The group have met twice during the year. They always welcome any proposals from parishioners as to how we might improve the Parish and its environment.

Walks

We organised two parish walks during the year. Only 20 walkers joined us. These events were joint ventures with Thame and Wheatley Ramblers. The one from Kingston Blount Village Hall attracted 14 walkers, mostly from the Parish. It was 7.5 miles. However the New Year's Day walk from Wendover only had 6 walkers - none from the Parish. It was a horrible rainy day so perhaps not surprising there were not many.

Improving the Parish Environment:

Aston Rowant Discovery Trail

The circular walk Trail remains very popular bringing more trade to the Leathern Bottle. Peter led Oxford HF (Holiday Fellowship) round the trail in June. We continue to see people from all parts of the country walking the route holding print outs taken off our website Also a group of over 40 Ramblers were seen recently.

The Trail is now on Trip Advisor so if you walk it please post your comments. It all helps with our publicity. You can also get the route map, directions, and points of interest by searching Aston Rowant Discovery Trail on Google.

Update on Five Ways, Church Lane, Aston Rowant.

The Parish Council is managing the area around the stream at Fiveways for Nature. The pathway through the trees has been improved and lengthened. More dead and weak trees have been removed, and hazels pollarded all of which allows light. The willows planted by the stream have grown well and soon the school children will be encouraged to cut them and use the branches for weaving wicker baskets.

Mike Eaton has taken the lead in redesigning the area and in organising the planting of wild flowers, all of which are indigenous species. He has recruited several volunteers to help with this work including Lynn and Graham French but he needs more help please.

More of the ground ivy has also been removed. This has encouraged the snow-drops to spread and aconites and wood anemones have started to flower in the same area along with snowflakes, marsh marigold and a few fritillaries. We have also




ROBIN NIXON POMPA Local Author

Many of you will have seen Robin Pompa out and about in the village with her three young children. But you may not know that she has also recently published *Allergy-Free Kids: The Science-Based Approach to Preventing Food Allergies.* Robin, who received a degree in neuroscience and behavior from Columbia University, used her back-

ground as a health and science journalist and her firsthand experience as a mother feeding three young children to write this book which has already received international press and excellent reviews.

When her infant daughter joined the 6 million children diagnosed with life-threatening food allergies, Robin ended up in the waiting room of Dr. Gideon Lack, author of the groundbreaking LEAP (Learning Early about Peanut allergy) and EAT (Enquiring about Tolerance) studies published by the *New England Journal of Medicine*. Dr. Lack's findings show that—diametrically opposed to previous recommendations—many children can avoid food allergies by regularly eating allergens such as eggs, nuts and dairy from early infancy until kindergarten. This life-changing approach is being embraced by the medical community, especially for nuts, and is reflected in new guidelines from the American Academy of Pediatrics, the American Acade



my of Allergy, Asthma and Immunology, and other major medical associations.

Having experienced as a parent the struggle of food allergies, Robin wanted to help other families avoid this daily stress, and reintroduce variety and joy to family meals. Robin carefully explains that instead of avoiding eggs, nuts, and other allergens, most parents should introduce them into their children's diets, 'early, carefully and often, for at least the first five years of life.' It is the secret to protecting children from what can be lifelong, life-threatening battles with food allergies. *Allergy-Free Kids* also includes seventy simple and delicious kid-friendly recipes to help parents integrate unfamiliar allergen foods into a child's diet. Divided by allergen, *the book* contains sections on Eggs, Peanuts and Tree Nuts, Cow's Milk, Sesame, Wheat, and Fish. It also discusses other foods, such as kiwi and soy, which are increasingly causing allergic reactions.

New medical guidelines aim to put an end to all wheat-free, nut-free, egg-free, and milk-free diets, and *Allergy-Free Kids* provides the cutting-edge framework to replace the avoidance approach.

Working with Aston Rowant School

Working with Aston Rowant Church.

Snowdrops and Duck Races at Fiveways and Cakes at Aston Rowant Church was repeated again in February. It again was a very busy day with more children taking part in the Duck Races this year as we worked more closely with the school in promoting the event. And a lot of cakes were eaten and teas drunk in the church. We have already agreed to repeat it next year on Sunday 11 February.

Rights of Way

Oxfordshire County Council Countryside Services gave us one free cut of path vegetation in the centre of the villages. We understand that this will continue as will their seasonal request to farmers to reinstate footpaths after ploughing.

Grants and donations of £15,000 have been promised for upgrading part of the surface of the Footpath AR7 which is the Moors footpath between Kingston Blount and Aston Rowant. The grant is from TOE2, Oxfordshire's Trust for the Environment with donations from Kingston Blount Brook Street Fair, Hillwerke Trust, and a land owner and funding from Aston Rowant Parish Council. Another grant has been applied for and further private donations sort. A total of £21,048 is required and it is hoped we will be able to complete the work in school holidays either at the end of May or this summer.

ARPC are urgently seeking donations please. We all love using this path and we need to improve the surface for walking in the wetter weather. **Please contact me if you are willing to make a donation.**

Entrances to the Villages

Once again the Parish Council warmly thanks Simon Coulon, who continues to plant, maintain and water the flower tubs in the villages. He gives his time, the plants and materials free of charge and the results are there for us all to appreciate. Thanks, Simon.

Litter and Fly Tipping

Litter and fly tipping is a constant problem along the roads and we are regularly in touch with SODC and their contractor, Biffa, to have this cleared.

We joined the National Great Litter Pick in March. Eight Parishioners helped fill 18 sacks of litter collected from the A40 lay by at the top of Aston Hill and from Kingston Hill road verges! Litter is a huge problem across the whole country.

I'd also like to thank our Parish litter picker, Robyn Leinster, and also Tony Hughes and Kate for volunteering to litter pick on the sides of the busy roads in the parish.

NOTES FROM THE ALLOTMENT Spring is here!

I am writing these notes on our Editorial deadline (May 15) and it is raining steadily!

The sole topic of conversation amongst gardeners this Spring has been the weather – particularly the lack of rain. It has been not only a dry Spring but also a cold one and we had quite a severe frost only last week!

(Yes, I can remember playing cricket some forty years ago on May 8th and it had snowed over night and we arrived at the ground in Leicestershire with a white covering across the outfield at 10.30 a m. By 12 noon we were sun bathing!)

Even if those of us who were prepared to water our young plants, had done so, the cold nights held back their growth. I have been waiting two weeks to get my plants on to my allotment, but I am hopeful it will happen this week.

During this enforced break I decided, following direction from 'the Management", to create some raised beds at the front of the house to use as a salad garden. Salad crops need fortnightly sowing and frequent picking to enjoy them at their best. I am not always in a position to achieve this on my allotment — there's too much cricket to watch at Lord's , The Oval or my beloved Grace Road.

The idea of having salads and herbs immediately to hand during the Summer is attractive. (My discussions with Management for next year's project suggest that a decent sized fruit cage may well be introduced.)

Holding back my allotment crops until mid-May on my sheltered patio does not, however, appear to have adversely effected them and it has certainly saved a lot of watering on the allotment.

Once everything is planted I anticipate some lovely warm sunshine and standing on my allotment watching everything grow. Warm rain from mid–May then some glorious sunshine in June, followed by warm, gentle rain from 2 to 4am each evening.

We don't ask for much, us allotment gardeners!

- 2. To protect the surrounding countryside, landscape, designated open spaces, farming and ecosystems.
- 3. To reduce road traffic congestion and improve road safety.
- 4. To promote new development for housing, leisure, community facilities and employment opportunities in accordance with locally defined needs.
- 5. To maintain the character and vitality of the parish's villages and hamlets and to enhance access to the countryside.
- 6. To promote high quality in the design of new buildings conducive with the need to reduce pollution and decrease energy-consumption.
