Due to the continuance of the Vacancy, Crowell services have remained reduced to one per month on Sundays plus one Soul Space per month on a Saturday.

Adding Eucharist to the Evening Prayer service on the first Sunday of alternate months has been well received. See below for extra services over December.

These have been made possible by support from the whole Ministry Team so please do come and support. You will be 'warmly' welcomed as the heating system has been completely replaced and is running well. The relaying of the floor tiles is nearly complete.

The B4009 bank has been cleared of dead wood and so the carpark is now open to view. This will assist police passing patrols. Sorry to keep moaning but if people could just take time to have a little thought for others then there would be no need to and our job of trying to keep everything under control, a lot easier and much more pleasant.

Our thanks go to our small band of willing helpers who assist us inside and outside the church. We won't embarrass you but you know who you are and you do a sterling job.

I am pleased to open this edition's update with the news that the new Parish Council website is now live. The new site (https://www.astonrowantparishcouncil.gov.uk/) provides quick access to meeting papers, planning applications and councillors' contact details. In addition, there are sections for all the main Council activities including Footpaths and Amenities, Highways and the Neighbourhood Plan. There are also links to a wide range of local facilities and services. The site also allows individuals to subscribe to receive an email as and when items on the website are updated. The new website is being delivered at a significant cost saving to the previous provider and yet offers greater functionality and flexibility. Finally, as this is the last edition of the Parish Notes in 2019, I should like to thank all the volunteers that help deliver many of the facilities and services in the Parish for their sterling work over the year. I wish you all the best for the Festive season and for 2020.

NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN

The Aston Rowant Neighbourhood Development Plan seems fated to take forever to get to the stage at which we can formally consult the parish. It was to be early in 2019, but SODC's change of direction regarding sites in smaller villages led to a delay of several months. In May this year, the local elections threw another spanner in our works, as the whole Local Plan was thrown up in the air – more delay over the summer. This autumn we decided to go ahead regardless of SODC's uncertainty, but the Minister of Housing pitched into the local plan debate, and local matters like ours stayed on the back-burner. Expecting, or rather hoping, that this would be resolved in October, to allow NP Consultation before Christmas, we have been foiled again, this time by Boris Johnson's call for a General Election in December. This puts all matters with any hint of a political flavour, including Neighbourhood Plan consultations, on hold until after 12 December. It would be wrong to start a consultation just before Christmas, so we'll be hoping that nothing stands in our way early in the New Year.

In the meantime, the draft Neighbourhood Plan has been made available for perusal on the Parish Council website – it's a gripping read and lack of familiarity will be a poor excuse when public meetings take place and comments are formally invited, in January February Whenever.

TRAFFIC CALMING

As mentioned previously the traffic calming scheme for Kingston Blount has been approved and we have a fully costed design ready for constriction. The difficult bit is securing all the money, and I have been fundraising for this for a long while now and I hope to have some good news soon.

I have made a number of grant applications to SODC and OCC. The most hopeful source would come from funding that is secured by SODC from housing developers under a new scheme called Community Infrastructure Levy or CIL. When new housing development is approved the developers have to pay a certain amount of money to SODC and that money has to be spent on infrastructure projects, such as traffic calming, but also highways improvements, pavements, footpaths etc. So when we apply for funding we are competing against other projects and there is no guarantee we will get the money. I have applied for funding from the CIL money obtained from the housing development in Chinnor and am arguing that the new housing will generate new and greater traffic issues for us here further down the B4009 and as such some of the money should be spent outside Chinnor to help elevate the traffic issue that the new housing will generate.

I continue to press SODC for the funds and hope to have a positive answer shortly. **Matthew Day,** Aston Rowant Parish Council

ASTON ROWANT SCHOOL HOUSE TRUST

The Aston Rowant School House Educational Trust was set up in 1992 when the former teacher's house, belonging to Aston Rowant Church of England Primary School, was sold. The money from the sale was invested to raise income which is available to assist with education.

The precise rules are that the Scheme allows the Trustees to apply the income:

- a) In or towards promoting the education of pupils attending the Aston Rowant Church of England Primary School.
- b) In or towards promoting the education (including social and physical training) of persons under the age of 25 years who have at any time attended the school or who are resident in the Parish of Aston Rowant.

Some residents in the parish may either have children or are themselves eligible to obtain a grant. To be considered you need to apply in writing to the Trustees who will consider applications at their bi-annual meetings in May and November. Each application will be considered on merit – there is no guarantee.

THE FOOTPATH & AMENITIES GROUP

Improving footpaths & bridleways in & out of the parish

Permissive Path from Kingston Blount to Crowell

We have decided to open the footpath to all walkers as of now. The official opening will come later after signs have been put up, further work to the surface at each end is completed and rubbish cleared at the Crowell end. I have to emphasise you walk it at your own risk, not that it is much of a risk compared to walking on the B4009! The signs will credit the land owner, Alan Hill, who granted the Parish Council a 30-year licence for use of his land, and to The Trust for Oxfordshire's Environment for offering a grant, and to the Parish Council, who have funded the project so far. As is required by most funding bodies, your Parish Council has offered a grant themselves.

Extension of the Permissive footpath from Crowell to Chinnor

Several Parishioners have asked why the footpath cannot be extended? Well of course it could and should be. But these things don't happen of their own accord and whilst it would be of huge advantage to our Parish, the responsibility shouldn't rest with ARPC.

The large majority of the land would again be in Crowell, and that Parish should take the lead with the support of ARPC and Chinnor Councils. First of all, discussions need to take place with the land owner. If he were to be in agreement, then I am sure that grants would be available to enable this to happen.

Planting of Trees

This winter, our group also hope to plant more Rowan trees and a Holm Oak along the Lower Icknield Way and at Fiveways subject to land owner permission.

New Year Parish Walk on Sunday 5 January

This year's circular walk will start from the Leathern Bottle pub in Lewknor at 10.00 on Sunday 5th January. It is 6 miles and will follow the route of the Aston Rowant Discovery Trail. One hill, no stiles, but please wear boots. Some of us will have lunch at the Leathern Bottle at about 1pm after the walk. Once again, this is a joint venture with Thame and Wheatley Ramblers and forms part of the Ramblers Christmas and New Year Walking Festival and is open to anyone who wants a good New Year Walk.

NEWS FROM FIVEWAYS

There is no shortage of water! The spring on the left going down Church lane has started up. All the springs emerge about the same distance from the Chilterns – along the B4009. The water is high quality and hence is increasingly abstracted, which is a problem for most rivers these days. In the Winter the springs are relatively warm which is welcomed by the fish. Coming from the Blue Cross, there is a very muddy ditch across the Lower Icknield way, this is where an ancient stream crossed the path and ran on towards what is now a copse on the left hand side going north.

I have had my first weed delivery after my last newsletter and I am now looking for helpers to put them in! There are very few flowers left now, just a few motley red Campion until the snowdrops flower in late January.

There have been a few dead and damaged American signal crayfish found on Church lane near Fiveways – I suspect it was otters – but there is no way of knowing. These crayfish (about 12 cm.) were full grown and sadly are very common in all Thames tributaries. If caught they have to be killed or eaten – to trap them you need an Environment Agency permit. Personally I think their culinary value is over-rated and are a lot of work to prepare. There are some professional trappers out there, but I will not be joining them. Some of the local lakes and rivers are trapped to remove this damaging alien species.

Over the coming months we will try to tidy up the shrubs and larger weeds and get ready for the duck racing on February 16th.

I haven't seen the water voles this year or the stoat. As the water rises it is worth watching for sticklebacks and bullheads when the water colours up. There are plenty of deer about though; some in small groups. It was a good year for butterflies with a lot of gatekeepers enjoying the flowers.

NEWS FROM ARCC

Firstly, best wishes to everyone as we approach the festive season. The end of the year means that it is now time to reflect on the events of 2019.

After our recent AGM, I am delighted to report that after a very poor 2018, the club has returned to profit in the year ending Sept 2019. Our thanks to all the people who supported the club through playing, social membership, sponsorship and use of the club facilities.

We would specifically like to thank committee members who have stood down after, in some cases, many years of service.

As reported in an earlier Parish Notes the club house is staying open on a Friday night, this will last until at least Christmas. On Sunday 15th December at lunchtime, we will see the return of the Christmas Cheese and Wine Lunch that used to be held every year, all are welcome to join us.

At the AGM, it was confirmed that we have withdrawn the revised application P19/S0842/FUL for the new pavilion. The original application still stands for another 18 months and the club is using that time to fully evaluate all options including the refurbishment of the old pavilion.

In the meantime, we are raising an application to replace the now dilapidated buildings that are on the cricket grounds. The biggest items are the sheds that have been used as dressing rooms since 2011. The proposed replacement portacabins, which will be sited in the same place as the current sheds, are not a permanent solution for the long term. But will allow us, in the short term, to have dressing rooms which are safe and waterproof. The proposal will also allow us to provide the separate changing facilities for the ever-increasing number of young ladies who are playing cricket. We are also proposing to purchase a shipping container to replace one of the storage sheds, which is close to falling down, and to also replace the 'ice-cream' van that has been used as a scoring box on the second ground since the new field was created. A simple garden shed will replace the van.

Another of our old players has joined the professional ranks with Dan Moriarty, who was our overseas player last year, signing a contract with Surrey. We wish him, Linsey Smith who has signed for the new ladies 100 competition in 2020 and Miles Hammond at Gloucestershire all the best for the future.

Finally, the club are looking, as ever, for new blood not just new players but also scorers and umpires. Anyone interested in these roles, for which both training is available and payment made, please contact either Simon Tremlin or myself, our contact details can be found on page 10 of these Parish Notes.
