LETTER FROM JOHN HOWELL MP

I join with people from across the world to express my deep sadness at the death of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. My deepest sympathies to King Charles III, his Queen Consort and all of the Royal Family at their loss. The affection that Her Majesty showed to all those she met is now reciprocated in the outpouring of grief. She will be sorely missed. May she rest in peace. Long live the King.

The House returned from the summer recess on Monday 5th September. It was always going to be an historic week with the incoming of a new Prime Minister on 6th September. The fact that the resignation of one Prime Minister and the invitation to another took place at Balmoral instead of the traditional Buckingham Palace was no great surprise as we have seen the frailty of the Queen in recent months. No one questioned the decision of a lady in her 90s asking for others to come to her. Having seen these events at Balmoral only a few days before her death meant that the news of her death came all the more as a shock, her dedication to duty and her service to the nation continuing to the end.

Having had one Monarch for seven decades most of us are seeing events that have not taken place in our lifetime and indeed with the advent of television during the late Queen's reign some of these ceremonies have never before been seen by more than a few. We greet our new King and indeed, barring tragedy, it will be a King that we welcome for the foreseeable future.

In Parliament normal business was suspended as we entered a period of national mourning. The House sat for two days to enable MPs and Lords to pay tribute to the late Queen, and for oaths to be sworn to His Majesty the King. The Palace of Westminster was prepared for the Lying in State and other procedural and ceremonial events. The timing is such that following the period of national mourning we would be entering the annual period of Party Conferences. However at the time of writing it is not clear whether these will go ahead and thus what the schedule for the sitting of the House will be. By the time this newsletter is published this will have been decided.

When the House returns there will be much to do, and the new Prime Minister will be able to proceed with her agenda to address the critical issues that our country faces. It is good that she just managed to squeeze in the key announcement on the support for people in relation to the energy crisis before these historical events took place. This has been widely welcomed.

ASTON ROWANT PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

In common with many public services and government offices, Council business was suspended during the period of mourning for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II. Instead, Councillors staffed sessions where parishioners could sign a book of condolences to commemorate the Queen's passing. It was an opportunity for people to reflect, and to share their emotions.

It was clear that the Queen touched all our lives - the youngest signatory is five and the oldest in her nineties. Several people arrived with notes already prepared; all expressed a sense of gratitude for the Queen's commitment and service. One person told me that, although he was not a monarchist, he wanted to sign the book of condolence to recognise Her Majesty's contribution to the country. He wrote "you were an inspiration to your nation and an example to all other heads of state". Quite frankly, she was an inspiration to us all.

In my last report, I noted the Council's disappointment that a planning application for the development of over fifty residences on the south side of the B4009 in Chinnor had been approved by the planning inspectorate. Sadly, since that application was approved, there has been another application, this time for the development of thirty two dwellings off Oakley Road. We have submitted our objection to the proposal and a substantial number of Chinnor residents have also voiced their opposition. The application is currently under consideration by the district's planning team; we await their decision with interest.

Our Parish is not immune from the planning interest. The Parish Council has been approached by a developer regarding a potential development on land to the south of the B4009 at the Crowell end of Kingston Blount. We have arranged a public meeting for 7:30pm on Tuesday 4th October in Kingston Blount Village Hall to allow the developers to present their ideas to parishioners, and for a public discussion on the proposals.

Preparation for winter

The past decade has seen more extreme weather than previous years – this year we have suffered both violent storms and drought. With winter fast approaching, there are various measures that should be taken to help reduce the potential impact of extreme weather. The Parish Council has already checked the levels of salt in the bins placed around the parish so that roads and pavements can be kept ice free.

I am sure that I don't need to remind too many people of the impact that Storms Eunice and Franklin had on households in the Parish – heavy rain and strong winds resulted in flooding and, in some cases, the loss of power for over eighty hours.

It is important to ensure that all ditches are well maintained and kept clear to reduce the risk of flooding. It is landowners' responsibility to maintain ditches that run across or in front of their property. Please ensure that all ditches and culverts are clear so that flooding does not become an issue in the Parish.

Whilst the lengthy power cut in February was caused by a failed power line across

open land, there is a risk that trees may interfere with power cables and potentially cause power outages. I have spoken to SSEN who have advised me that it is home owners' and landowners' responsibility to ensure that that any trees on their land are kept trimmed so that they are clear of power cables. However, where trees have grown around power cables or are touching power cables, SSEN will arrange for a tree cutter or arborist to attend the site in order to inspect the trees to at least assess the work required if not carry out the remedial work then. To apply for tree cutting, visit the SSEN website at

https://www.ssen.co.uk/our-services/existing-electricity-supplies/tree-cutting or call 0800 0483516. I understand that this service is free of charge.

It certainly has been a wonderful summer for hot sunny weather. I understand the concerns with climate change but it has been good to feel the sun. It reminds me so much of 1976 but then we did not have a garden and so I was not a slave to watering. Much as I dislike wet weather it has been a boon to get back the hours I've spent with the watering can.

The hot weather has meant that very little has happened since the last parish notes and the next event will be the FAAG meeting on Tuesday Oct 18th at 7.30pm in Kingston Blount Village Hall. As was explained in the last notes this is an open meeting where we will be discussing amongst other things the future of Pleck Wood, the wood at the end of the playing field. The agenda for the meeting will be published prior to the meeting on the parish web site. I have bought some native daffodil bulbs which will be planted in the autumn and will then hopefully spread in time. If anyone has any English Bluebells that could be planted at the same time it would be greatly appreciated. The date for the planting will be set at the meeting, as will the date for the autumn Litter Pick – this is pencilled in for Nov 26th and 27th but not yet confirmed.

The major event will however be the long-planned improvement of the 'Lanes' in Kingston Blount which will continue at the end of October. I will be double checking with the householders who back onto the 'Lanes' before we start as this will be a one-off task.

In terms of the grass cutting, our contractor of the last few years has given notice and we will be looking for another contractor next year to take over the cutting and maintenance of the lanes in both villages. I would like to thank George Stevens and his team for the help and guidance they have given to the committee in total and myself in particular. Good luck to them in the future, they have set a high bar to follow.

Finally, the people with good memories will recall that Mike Smith kindly built 2 owl boxes for the parish. We will be putting them up over the winter, one is for Fiveways but the other is still not finalised, any suggestions?

So after a quiet period in the summer, it's going to be a busy autumn.



NEWS FROM FIVEWAYS

At the time of writing we have finally had some rain. The Jubilee Mulberry has survived well with regular watering of muddy water. It is a black Mulberry from Shakespeare's garden in Stratford, raised with great difficulty from seed and is 5 years old. There are two more black mulberries on the site and a white one by the signpost. They are slow growing and take a decade to fruit. There are a few wild flowers to be seen especially the yellow toadflax – there are pink and purple variants as well, but the yellow one seems to be the one that spreads by underground roots.

Changing the subject to Church Lane, there have been several incidents this year which have damaged the track due to large



modern farm equipment driving down the lane. In the most recent incident, at the lower end by the copse, there appears to have been a fire which fortunately did not spread – it could have been a serious fire with the drought. In most cases the culprit has not been identified. The damage will worsen when the stream flows again!

On the subject of Church Lane I recently had a chance to look carefully at the early map which hangs in the church – sadly I cannot reproduce it here for copyright issues! It clearly shows what I have long suspected – that the original course of the stream was down the southwest side of the Church Lane track – not on the northeast as now. The stream went across the track (wet in winter) where the Winterbourne (winter only stream) and the Holbrook meet at the junction. The point can be identified now by a pile of farm concrete. It continued to Fiveways in the overgrown hedge on the southwest side and if you look carefully you can see the course of the stream, now a shallow ditch. At some point ca 1800 the present deep ditch was dug out and a pipe put in under Church Lane at Fiveways – this has kept the lane dry – except in times of flood. It is also the reason there is a wildlife corridor following the lane to the SW – it is used by deer, foxes and badgers.

The early map also shows two long church houses on the northeast side of Church Lane. No traces of them remain. The two small cottages at this point on the SW side on the map can be seen today in field markings. It is possible this stream was used for metal work or milling as we find lots of small pieces of iron when we drag a magnet through. There is also a structure hidden in the bank at the top end.

I reported earlier that we had seen sticklebacks return this year and I am hoping they have survived the low water, helped by the fish sanctuaries that we put in.

It will soon be time to tidy up for the winter. There are three small dead trees to

remove but fortunately the undergrowth and brambles haven't gone mad this year. The main work will be pre-duck racing – should it ever happen again!

There are otters in the area again so watch out for your fish. I am concerned at the prospect of the new houses at Chinnor as they will be close to the sources of the Crowell stream which runs towards Sydenham. I would like to think that damage to these chalk streams will be protected by the authorities, but I know that there is no effective control of waste water.

I still have some free bat boxes left if anyone would like one. The PC have funded the purchase of more wild daffodils and they will be planted in the Autumn.

By the time these notes are published the 2022 cricket season will have finished and the pavilion will be closed for the winter. The 3rd and 4th teams finished the league season strongly and will both look to do better next year.

The final event of the year was President's Day and our thanks to Angie Murray and Harry Shepherd for organising the day. The two games played on the day had close finishes with one game tied by a 6 off the last ball and the other game being won by the President's team off the last ball.

This was followed by the end of the season ball and presentation night, details of which will be in the next notes, as will a summary of the successful junior teams performance this year.

The club will now spend the winter planning for next year, hopefully we will have news on the proposed wooden pavilion for the bottom field in the next notes. Also, can I repeat my annual request for people to come forward to train as both umpires and scorers, both roles are paid for by the club and training is available for both roles.

WARM HOME DISCOUNT RULES UPDATED FOR 2022-23

As winter approaches, many people will be nervously anticipating the cold weather and its inevitable effect on their heating bills. The Warm Home Discount (WHD) was introduced by the government in 2011 to offset some of this burden.

For 2022-2023 there have been a couple of significant changes to the WHD: the number of energy suppliers participating in the scheme will increase, and those on disability benefits who don't have low incomes nor high energy costs will not receive the WHD.

The value of the WHD payment is currently £150. Nobody needs to apply in order to receive it, with the exception of those living in mobile homes on a park home site (see below). The payment is credited automatically to the consumer's electricity supply account (or credit is directly applied to a pre-payment meter), and energy suppliers have to make this payment by 31 March each year at the latest.

Eligibility for the WHD is ascertained by means of data-matching between energy suppliers and government departments. There are three eligible groups of consumers: low-income pensioner households; low-income people on some means-tested benefits; and households with high energy costs. This last criterium is determined by the type of property you live in, especially its age and its floor area (based on information supplied by the Valuation Office Agency or the Land Registry).

There is an alternative form of WHD for those living in mobile homes on park home sites. For more information about this, visit www.gov.uk and search for "Warm Home Discount". HEDGEHOG FUNDAYS

The parish held two hedgehog Fundays in July, one at Aston Rowant churchyard and another at Crowell churchyard. On both occasions, hedgehog tunnels were laid. The object was to see if there were any hedgehogs in the churchyards since the numbers have declined over the last few years.

The photographs show the steps in setting up the hedgehog tunnel at Crowell.

The tunnel insert is prepared by smearing vegetable oil with soot onto one of the pads.

This is placed on the insert and the tunnel is put together. The food is placed in the centre of the board which is then placed into the tunnel and placed in a selected site. On checking several days later there was no evidence of footprints but the food had gone. The food was replaced but unfortunately a few days later, there was no evidence of hedgehogs in the form of little footprints.

After a week there were still no footprints but, like Crowell, all the hedgehog food had been eaten.

So far none of the hedgehog tunnels laid at the four churchyards have produced any evidence of hedgehogs. However, we do know that there are hedgehogs in the gardens of parishioners who live close to the four churches. A tunnel was laid in one of these gardens and footprints were found.

Evidence that hedgehogs have been found in Chinnor gardens has been independently corroborated by the hedgehog sighting website: https://bighedgehogmap.org/holes-for-hedgehogs-home/map-hedgehog-sighting. Interestingly, there have been eight logs just for Chinnor village.
