LETTER FROM JOHN HOWELL MP

Having been through a rather turbulent period I am pleased that we now have Rishi Sunak as our Prime Minister. He has had my support over the months, and I believe that he will be the person to get to grips with the key issues that we face.

It is interesting to reflect on the issues that have been before us in recent months and also the reactions that come forward. Understandably there are strongly held views and in this time of Remembrance it seems to me that there is plenty of room for shared understanding, moderation and mutual tolerance.

Take for example the attendance of the Prime Minister at COP27. Within a few days of taking office his initial response was that he could not attend due to needing to focus on the immediate national issues before him. He faced a backlash on that and, once he had been able to assess the workload on his desk, agreed that he could go. However rather than this being seen as a decision based on assessment of the situation it was dubbed as a U turn. If politicians 'stick to their guns' they may be accused of not listening. If they give serious thought to an issue and have a change of heart they are accused of a U turn. Either way there is an accusation to face.

It is good that the Prime Minister has pledged to return to the 2019 manifesto which was supported through the General Election. It promised an ambitious environmental programme with robust action on climate change and nature loss. It is important to note that protecting our environment does not mean sacrificing economic growth. Green measures can reduce the cost of living, create employment, investment and export opportunities, and safeguard our long-term prosperity and security. It is also important to ensure that measures taken are affordable and encourage people to make environmentally friendly decisions. It is precisely this need to bring people with us that protest groups overlook. It is not about who shouts loudest or makes the grandest gestures but about how we work together to resolve the important issues of our time.

Let us also consider the issue of storm discharges where untreated sewage is released into rivers. I completely agree that sewage pollution is not acceptable but when these discharges of untreated sewage are released into a river it is when water levels are exceptionally high and there is risk of flooding to properties. If you live in a property which would be flooded with raw sewage this might have a strong influence on your view and the realistic timescales for improvement.

ASTON ROWANT PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Many communities depend on volunteer run centres to provide additional care and support for a wide range of community groups. We are fortunate to have the Chinnor Village Centre in our region. The Centre is a focal point for a variety of activities and support groups allowing all from Chinnor and the surrounding parishes (including Aston Rowant and Crowell) to connect and socialise, building a community spirit and a sense of belonging and homeliness. The Centre relies on volunteers to keep it running and to raise funds to meet its ongoing costs. However, the Covid-19 pandemic and subsequent lockdowns greatly disrupted business streams and fundraising activities during 2020 and 2021. This, together with inflation and the withdrawal of most support from local government, has left a significant hole in the Centre's finances. The Trustees are actively seeking new sources of funding to secure the future of the Village Centre. The Parish Council has agreed to increase the grant it provides to the Centre in recognition of the support it provides to our parishioners and the Centre's value to the community. In addition, the Centre has launched a crowd funding appeal to raise funds to secure the immediate future of the Village Centre. If you would like to donate, please visit www.justgiving.com/crowdfunding/thevillagecentre.

Whilst the Village Centre in Chinnor is predominately used by the older members of the Parish, the playground at Kingston Blount is a well used facility by those under 11. Much of the equipment in the playground is now reaching end of life; the activity centre has had to be modified to remove the bridge between the two sections and the climbing net has also had to be removed. Both the Parish Council and a number of parents have recognised that the playground needs significant investment to continue to be a valuable asset to the community. I would like to thank Laura Purse for taking the lead on reforming a committee to raise funds to refurbish the playground area. We, as a Parish Council, recognise that the Playground is a major asset for the Parish and needs a reserve for the ongoing maintenance. Consequently, we shall be adding a line item to the Parish accounts to build that reserve. We are grateful to Laura for taking on this role. That said, if you are interested in helping out raising funds to refurbish the playground and have not already expressed an interest, please contact the Clerk at clerk@astonrowantparishcouncil.gov.uk.

Moving away from parochial issues, it is clear that the country as a whole needs to generate more sustainable power. There are a number of outline plans for solar power farms along the M40 corridor between junctions 6 and 7. The Parish Council recognises the need for the UK to generate more power in a sustainable way but also there is a balance between the need to generate power and the need to maintain farmland to reduce our dependency on imported food. We are engaging with our neighbouring parishes to ensure that we have a coordinated approach to sustainable energy.

I was pleased that there was a good turn out for the defibrillator training at the start of the month. Whilst we continue to invest in installing defibrillators across the Parish, the training on how to respond to a potential heart attack or seizure will increase the effectiveness of that investment and, hopefully, reduce the likelihood of

a fatality in the Parish. Whilst we will continue to invest in this equipment, it is one investment that we hope will never be utilised.

Finally, we are at the stage where we are considering the budget for the coming year. As you may have noted, I have talked about increasing expenditure in a number of areas to support activities both within and outwith our parish that benefit our parishioners. We are conscious that there may be some that are struggling to meet their bills as inflation and the increased cost of energy starts to take effect. Consequently we are working to set a budget that does not increase the Parish Council aspect of your Council Tax bill or, if this cannot be achieved, a budget that increases that contribution by less than the current inflation rate. If you are struggling to make ends meet, Oxfordshire County Council has compiled a web page to bring together advice from local and national organisations on saving energy and cutting costs – see www.oxfordshire.gov.uk/living.

ARPC FOOTPATH AND AMENITIES GROUP

It seems incredible with all the rain we have had in the last few weeks that the hosepipe ban is still in place, but if you walk onto the Nature Reserve at Chinnor you will see that the main lake is still over a metre down on its usual levels. It is a very clear indication of the effect of the drought we had earlier in the summer and the effects of global warming.

In terms of the FAAG group, by the time that the notes are published we will have finished the autumn litter pick and can we thank all the volunteers who will have helped. We would also like to thank the residents of Aston Rowant who are keeping the litter on the B4009 in check by picking the litter themselves.

Also, the long-awaited work to reduce the bushes and trees in the Kingston Blount 'Lanes' will be underway. We will take out the overhanging and therefore potentially unsafe branches and bushes from the 'Lanes'. Hopefully this will also allow more light into the 'Lanes' which in turn may allow dormant bulbs to grow.

We have planted 200 daffodils in both the Fiveways Nature Reserve and Pleck Wood – this will be start of an annual planting exercise which will next year include the 'Lanes'.

Oxford County Council officers are visiting Church Lane to review the damage caused to the ditches by vehicles – we will update when a decision on the remedial action is agreed.

In terms of future events, we have the parish walk on Sunday 8th Jan 2023, details of which are in Peter Hetherington's notes (see p21). On Sunday February 19th we are delighted to co-host Snowdrop Sunday with Aston Rowant Church – please note the date, there will be more details in the next Parish Notes.

The next meeting for the group is on Tuesday 21st Feb 2023 in Kingston Blount Village Hall, which is an open meeting. In last July's notes we explained that whilst the maintenance of the parish footpaths will always be an important part of our activities it is not the only part of the group's work. We would like to expand the activities and also encourage more people to join us, the visits to 5 Ways by the Forest School are part of this increasing the awareness.

The competition to rename the group into something more relevant is still open. First prize is £25 of vouchers with another £25 for the best name from anyone under 16. Should the winner be a junior the first prize will be £50.

NEWS FROM FIVEWAYS

We have had a big issue with active wasps nests this Autumn at Fiveways. There were four nests until well into November when you would expect all wasps to have disappeared. We worked hard to move them as we were expecting a visit from Forest school but we didn't manage it in time. Finally I think they have now gone and we can hopefully rearrange the visit. The



ground obviously stayed very warm and it is still dry a few inches down. The ground is extensively tunnelled which is good for wasps seeking a winter home.

The stream bed, you will notice, has been cleared out and the fish refuges (clay pipes) are now visible – please do not move them about! In recent months we have removed all the dead hazardous trees plus some ivy.

The date for duck racing in the new year is the 19th February from 2pm to 4pm - sadly this has been cancelled in the last few years, although there was one participant last year. Let's hope there are no storms, flooding or pestilence!

A small group have planted the area with more daffodils and fritillaria. The daffodils (100+ of both native species) went in easily. Mice won't eat them as they are poisonous, unlike the fritillaria which are rodents' favourite food. We planted 200 of them four inches deep and coated them in chilli powder as a deterrent. This turned out to be more poisonous for my wife, as despite gloves she got chilli in a cut. Some daffodils also went into Pleck Wood. Be very careful if buying bluebells as they could be alien Spanish ones like most of those in local gardens.

The spotted woodpeckers in the dead tree are a new sighting - they are shy but very noisy when woodworking. There is a video on the parish website. There is also a video of big American Signal Crayfish in the Church Lane stream. Ideally as an alien species they should be despatched. They were not in Aston Lake but it may only be a question of time. They do shed their shells from time to time and are then vulnerable to carp. A big problem is the tunnelling into banks which starts leaks.

The Footpath and Amenities Group are proposing the following names for the bigger streams crossing our parish but are open to any other suggestions. In the longer term they are best protected if they are named. Streams which flow only in Winter are called winterbournes.

Could I remind people that the streams provide drinking water for animals – rubbish and manure should not be put in dry ditches or watercourses. All our streams go, via Thame Park, into the River Thame. It is likely that any ditches are the legal responsibility of the adjacent landowner who is responsible for their maintenance. They are not for garden rubbish.

I am looking for one or two oak saplings (less than 1metre) and hollies (1ft) but not from the wild, for planting in the parish if anyone knows of any.

For me it's a great excuse to only sweep up the leaves on the lawn, leaving the rest to rot down and feed the soil, protect the plants in the flowerbeds from frost, and offer shelter for the dozens of small creatures that are all around us. UNDER PRESSURE TO USE ENERGY PRE-PAYMENT METER?

In the concluding months of 2022, Citizens Advice is expecting to see more cases of a disturbing trend: low-income families with energy supply debts being pressured or even coerced into using pre-payment meters for their gas and electricity. Energy

supplied by pre-payment meters costs more than energy paid by direct debit or ondemand, and this comes at a time when drastically increased price tariffs this autumn will probably see most people's fuel bills double.

Energy suppliers are legally obliged to negotiate repayment plans with customers who are falling behind on their bills, but many suppliers are ignoring this requirement and proceeding with installing pre-payment meters - or, for customers with smart meters, remotely switching them to prepayment.


