The High Street went right down to the Lions.

Railings at the church went in the second World War. The War Memorial was in Kingston Blount until a few years ago, when it was moved outside of Aston Rowant Church.

Beacon Cottage. Dad was a groom/gardener. They lived in the tin cottage opposite. They went to Woodway in ~~1928~~ (1933)

Went to Aston School until 11 then to Chinnor.

The shop next door was a butcher's shop, being the house in front of Parkers. It was also a pig and poultry farm until long after the war.

Could tell time by the train. 11.40 when working on the farm.

Went to market in horse and cart as a child.

Cis Parker was the first woman Manageress of Cook's Travel.

His brother was groom for Joc Hill at Crowell.

Bob Bennet had poultry farm in the Meadows behind Mr Janaway's house.

Took loads of hay to London. Uncle Harry in Crowell tied hay as a living.
